

WATCH OUT FOR Limited route network compared to Gulf carriers, and fares can spike on transatlantic routes during peak travel periods.



WHAT IT'S LIKE Dubai's flagship carrier sets the benchmark for global travel, offering modern aircraft, exceptional service, and smooth connections through its world-class hub.

BUSINESS CLASS? Lie-flat seats, premium lounges, and fine dining define the experience, with first class and new premium economy options available.

WATCH OUT FOR Fares can be high during peak seasons, and Dubai's busy hub may require long walks between connecting gates.


BUSINESS CLASS? Spacious lie-flat seats, exceptional cuisine, and attentive service make it a standout choice for long-haul travelers across all classes.

TIMELESS ICONS

These landmarks have shaped Mumbai's character for centuries, offering travelers a deeper connection to the city's past and present.

GATEWAY OF INDIA

Commissioned in 1911 and completed in 1924 to welcome King George V and Queen Mary, this Indo-Saracenic masterpiece has become Mumbai's most enduring emblem. Once the ceremonial entrance for British dignitaries, it now opens onto a vibrant harbor filled with yachts and ferries. The view at dusk, framed by the Taj Mahal Palace, captures Mumbai's regal heart.

ELEPHANTA CAVES

A short cruise from the Gateway of India, these 5th-century rock-cut temples dedicated to Lord Shiva reveal Mumbai's ancient soul. The main cave's colossal Trimurti sculpture, symbolizing creation, preservation, and destruction, stands as a breathtaking testament to India's spiritual artistry. For the luxury traveller, a private guided tour transforms this UNESCO World Heritage site into an intimate journey through time and mythology.

MARINE DRIVE

Built in the 1920s, this sweeping boulevard along the Arabian Sea was designed as an elegant promenade for the city's elite. By night, its streetlights trace a graceful arc that resembles a string of pearls, earning it the name Queen's Necklace. From sunset strolls to sea-view lounges, Marine Drive captures Mumbai's rhythm, blending heritage, leisure, and coastal allure.

THE TAJ MAHAL PALACE

Opened in 1903, The Taj Mahal Palace stands as one of India's most storied hotels and a symbol of refinement on the Mumbai waterfront. Its Indo-Saracenic architecture, grand staircases, hand-painted ceilings, and collection of rare artworks reflect more than a century of heritage and hospitality. Over the decades, the hotel has welcomed royalty, film icons, and world leaders. Today, the experience remains one of timeless elegance, where every detail speaks to tradition, service, and a sense of place overlooking the Arabian Sea.

HAJI ALI DARGAH

Built in 1431, this white marble mosque and tomb seems to float on the Arabian Sea. Constructed in honor of a wealthy merchant-turned-saint, it stands as a symbol of Mumbai's spiritual openness. The causeway leading to it disappears during high tide — a reminder that beauty here is bound to time and tide.

BANDRA-WORLI SEA LINK

Completed in 2010, the Bandra-Worli Sea Link is a modern engineering landmark that transformed the way the city moves. Spanning the Arabian Sea, its cable-stayed design and sweeping views connect the historic heart of Mumbai with the contemporary energy of Bandra. Crossing the bridge offers a sense of scale and ambition, where ocean, skyline, and speed come together. For the luxury traveller, the Sea Link is not just infrastructure but a statement of Mumbai's ongoing evolution.

When Mumbai's Gateway of India became a runway for Maria Grazia Chiuri's Dior

On the night of 30 March, Mumbai adorned herself in Dior. On one hand, the majestic Gateway of India was bathed in a warm yellow light, while across from it stood the magnificent Taj Mahal Palace, glittering. In between, leading the way to a grand celebration, was a runway lined with thousands of marigolds. A monumental toran—a traditional Indian door hanging used to decorate the main entrance of home—greeted everyone who entered.

Nearly 46 feet long, in the shadow of the Gateway and complementing its outline, it was handcrafted by the master artisans and women of the Chanakya School of Craft in intricate embroidery and mirror work. It was a dream made real by Maria Grazia Chiuri, the visionary creative director of Dior, and Karishma Swali, the artistic soul of Chanakya School of Craft—cross-cultural friend and collaborator for over three decades.

The stage was set, and as the models walked the gateway, a stunning kaleidoscope of colours, cultures, and landscapes descended upon the audience. The collection featured a stunning array of black silks, rani pinks, Madras checks, and Banarasi brocades, expertly cut under Chiuri's refined eye. Nehru-collar shirts and sari-inspired skirts blended seamlessly into the collection. This was no mere tokenism or romanticism, but an honest and contemporary representation that transcended cultural geographic boundaries.

Parisian glamour finds new expression in the heart of Mumbai.




On the atrium floor of Galeries Lafayette Mumbai, a lotus-motif parchinkari inlay sets the tone for the experience. The eye naturally travels upward to the Cupola suspended overhead, a sculptural form inspired by l’Intrépide, the French observation balloon of 1796. It introduces a sense of quiet drama, encouraging visitors to look up, slow down and take in the architecture around them.

Throughout the five-storey, 90,000 square foot space, Indian artists and craftspeople leave a distinct imprint. Murals, mixed media installations and digital narratives appear throughout the store, interpreting Parisian motifs through local sensibilities. A concept-driven floor draws on the Modernist language of Le Corbusier’s Chandigarh, expressed through precise color, material and proportion. The dialogue between Indian craft and French elegance is not symbolic. It is structural.

For those familiar with Galeries Lafayette’s Parisian flagship, the echoes are clear: the grandeur, the light, the emphasis on retail as cultural encounter. Yet the Mumbai chapter is shaped by the city that hosts it. Located within two restored heritage buildings in the historic Fort district, the store becomes part of the neighborhood’s ongoing story. The architecture honors what came before while welcoming a new era of urban luxury.

Galeries Lafayette Mumbai is therefore more than a destination to shop. It is an experience of place, of history and of exchange. A space where Mumbai’s creative energy meets a Parisian legacy and where both are given room to evolve.

Thoughtfully designed and crafted to last, each piece reflects Nicobar's modern, nature-aligned approach to living. MULMUL

Mulmul brings together fine materials, delicate craftsmanship and quietly luxurious design.

Rooted in Jaipur's artisanal heritage, the label creates effortless silhouettes that feel soft, pure and thoughtfully made. Each piece reflects a commitment to honest craft and everyday elegance. shopmulmul.com



HATSU

Hatsu brings a bold, playful edge to contemporary home design with lighting, furniture and rugs that double as art pieces. OBATAIMU

This Japanese-inspired brand operates from a concept store-cum-tailoring workshop that's open for only part of the year. If you do manage to make it during its ongoing season, expect to find one-of-a-kind contemporary clothing in innovative textiles for him and her. obataimu.com

From Bandra's cosy cafés to Lower Parel's polished dining rooms, new spots are blending regional traditions with modern flair. Even the heritage lanes of Fort and Colaba buzz with young chefs reviving old spaces. With bold concepts opening across the city and global influences meeting local favourites, Mumbai's culinary landscape is evolving faster—and more deliciously—than ever.



JUST THE BASICS

Mumbai's simplest pleasures start at **Mag St. Café**, where easy all-day plates keep things uncomplicated. **Kitchen Garden** leans fresh and ingredient-led, serving crisp bowls that regulars rely on. Nearby, **Kala Ghoda Café** remains a quiet staple for sourdough, coffee, and clean comfort. And for a playful take on the basics, **Boojee** delivers light, familiar flavours with a modern touch.

THE SILK ROUTE

Mumbai's refined Asian dining starts at **Golden Dragon**, where classic Cantonese and Sichuan dishes arrive with effortless elegance. **Yauatcha** brings sleek dim sum and modern flair, while **Royal China** anchors the city's love for polished, traditional plates. For a broader sweep of flavours, **By the Mekong** blends Thai, Vietnamese, and Chinese notes with views that elevate every bite.

PARSI CLASSIC

Mumbai's Irani café culture shines brightest at **Jimmy Boy**, where berry pulao, dhansak, and leisurely lunches feel like a warm nod to Old Bombay. Set in the heart of Fort, the café pairs its heritage charm with unfussy, comforting plates that keep regulars returning for the same familiar flavours.



THE LUXE LIST

Mumbai's high-end dining peaks at **Masque**, where seasonal Indian tasting menus and inventive techniques set the city's culinary pace. **Papa's** brings a warm, Mediterranean-inspired elegance, while **Americano** blends polished service with quietly confident, impeccably crafted plates. And for a glamorous, see-and-be-seen setting, **Bastian** at the Top delivers signature classics.

THE SPICE ROOM

Ishaara sets a warm, inviting tone with thoughtful service and clean, well-crafted regional dishes. **Peshawri** follows with bold tandoor flavours and hearty North-West Frontier classics, while **The Sahib Room & Kipling Bar** brings a touch of old-world charm, serving refined plates in a quietly luxurious setting.

EAT WITH EYES

Luna et Sol sets the tone with warm textures, sculptural lighting, and earthy, sunlit palettes that feel quietly luxurious. **Baglami** leans into Mediterranean elegance, its soft curves and washed tones creating a transportive, coastal ease. **Scarlett House** makes a statement with bold colour and modern detailing, while **Paradox** delivers sleek, contemporary design that turns every visit into a visual experience.

ON THE STREET

Bademiya has long been the late-night stop for smoky kebabs hot off the grill, a crowd gathered around as skewers sizzle and rolls are wrapped in seconds. **Ayub's** offers its own iconic take, serving juicy tikkas and buttery roomali rotis to hungry regulars who know exactly what they're there for. Together, they deliver the city's most essential street-side flavours — fast, bold, and endlessly satisfying.



INSIDE MUMBAI'S MOST SPECTACULAR CULTURAL MARVEL

The Nita Mukesh Ambani Cultural Centre rises as Mumbai's transformative hub for art, fashion, design and performance — fusing Indian heritage with global ambition.

A gleaming architectural marvel in the heart of Mumbai's Bandra Kurla Complex, the Nita Mukesh Ambani Cultural Centre (NMACC) stands as one of India's most ambitious cultural undertakings to date. Conceived as a home for the finest creative expression from India and the world, the Centre represents a monumental step in reimagining how the country engages with art, performance and design on a global scale. For founder Nita Ambani, the intention was clear: to build a world-class institution that honours India's heritage while embracing contemporary creativity. "Art opens the mind," she says — a philosophy that resonates through every detail of the complex.

The building itself blends grandeur with symbolism. Inspired by Indian craft and traditional motifs, its façade — envisioned with the creative direction of Isha Ambani — is marked by three sculptural golden leaves, a nod to the sacred significance of the number three in Indian culture. Inside, a palette of marble, intricate patterns and major commissioned artworks creates a visual tapestry celebrating India's artistic lineage. Visitors are greeted by installations that set the tone for the experience ahead: Yayoi Kusama's shimmering stainless steel Clouds mirrors Mumbai's shifting skies, while Kamal Kunj, the world's largest commissioned Pichwai painting, connects the space to centuries of inherited craft.

At the heart of the Centre lies the Grand Theatre, a **2,000-seat**

masterpiece modelled on iconic global venues. Designed for immersive experiences, it features a programmable lighting system studded with more than 8,400 Swarovski crystals that cast a soft, multidimensional glow across the space. With Dolby Atmos Surround Sound, a Virtual Acoustic System, custom acoustic wood paneling and Poltrona Frau seating, the theatre is engineered for unparalleled sensory depth. Eighteen private Diamond Boxes add a rarefied layer of luxury, complete with suites and dedicated hospitality. Recording facilities, projection capabilities and translation booths ensure the theatre operates at international standards, positioning it as a destination for major productions from around the world.



Alongside the Grand Theatre, the Centre houses two additional performance venues designed to nurture experimentation and innovation. The Studio Theatre, equipped with telescopic seating and India's first tension wire grid, offers a flexible black-box environment

ideal for contemporary productions. The Cube, an intimate space for new voices and avant-garde performance, supports emerging artists exploring new media, movement and form. Complementing its performance spaces, NMACC's 16,000 sq ft Art House stands as Mumbai's newest museum-standard exhibition destination. It opened with "Sangam/Confluence," a landmark exhibition co-curated by Jeffrey Deitch and Ranjit Hoskote, which brought together leading Indian and international contemporary artists in a dialogue that reflects India's long history of transcultural exchange. The Centre also debuted "India in Fashion," curated by Hamish Bowles, a sweeping exploration of India's influence on global fashion from the 18th century to today. With archival couture from Dior, Balenciaga, Chanel and Yves Saint Laurent displayed alongside the works of Indian fashion legends including Sabyasachi, Manish Malhotra and Tarun Tahiliani, the exhibition offered one of the most comprehensive narratives of India's sartorial impact ever presented.

Ultimately, the Nita Mukesh Ambani Cultural Centre is more than an architectural achievement; it is a cultural bridge. In every sense, NMACC is a declaration of India's cultural future — confident, connected and undeniably world-class.
